Dear friend of SkyART,

I am thinking about a memory that often comes up when I take people on a tour of SkyART Studios. It is sparked when we reach the kitchen and I describe why it is attached to a studio. I explain that what happens in the kitchen – the act of cooking, tasting, eating, or simply a delicious smell – can be just as important to the experience and feel of SkyART as what happens in the studios. I believe that is the foundation, for many, of knowing they're in a place where their basic needs will be met, an essential part of us being that third space for our young people.

My memory is from when I was little. I may have been five or six years old. I was in an after-school program at a big house, a community center of sorts in the small town where I grew up. In this big house, you could choose the activity you wanted to do each day, and one day I chose cooking. I may have chosen it every day, but I only vividly remember this one particular day, and the feeling. We were baking. The smell filled the halls, and when the baked goods came out of the oven, I just remember the warmth, the sweetness, the comfort, and the happiness I felt in that place.



That memory, that brief moment, has contributed to shaping my life's work. That deep feeling of well-being, and the desire to give others the chance to feel the same, informs my practice, how I communicate, and how I choose to effect lives. We want every young person at SkyART to experience a sense of security, connectedness, and belonging. Your support and your belief in what we do makes that happen. Just the other day he said, "I'm 12 and I'm a junior volunteer. When I turn 14, I will be a volunteer. When I turn 18, I will be an intern. And when I'm 20, I will be a teaching artist working at SkyART. Because I know what I want to be, working to be an artist. That's all I dream of to be. Me. To be me."
